

The Public Policy Program is a **rigorous, interdisciplinary major** intended for individuals who seek to **analyze public policy issues** and **implement solutions**. The program is designed to give students the tools and background needed to understand **the role of public policy in society**, how public policies are developed and implemented, the conflicts in **fundamental human values** that often animate **policy debates**, and how to evaluate policy options.

Major Requirements

The Public Policy major requires successful completion of 11 total courses as follows:

- Principles of Macroeconomics (ECN 102)
- Processes of American Government (POL 111)
- Public Policy (PPL 213)
- Introductory Statistics (MTH 125)
- Research Methods (POL 340)
- One ethics course (choose one):
 Social and Political Philosophy (PHL 135)

Environmental Ethics (PHL 231) Political Thought-Modern (POL 342)

Global Ethics (PPL 300)

- Three courses within a policy emphasis*
- One field-specific internship experience that must be preapproved by PPL director
- One capstone course: Policy Analysis Seminar (PPL 400)
